Bible App for Kids Lessons KIDStory Overview

There are 4 core attributes that define what KIDStory is about. You will find these attributes woven throughout the various KIDStory resources, including the lessons found in this book. The lessons are created with these 4 things in mind:

- **Fun** ... Because it needs to stick. Children of all ages enjoy and remember things when they are having fun. When you make it fun, they will want to come back for more.
- **Relational** ... We are in this together. The end result is that we want children to be drawn closer to the Lord through a relationship with Jesus Christ. This can happen as you build a relationship with them and they develop friendships with one another. Discipleship, as Jesus modeled with his disciples, happens when these relationships are made possible. The *Response Question* at the end of each lesson allows you to discover what God is showing each child which you can follow up on.
- **Reproducible** ... Keep it simple and practical so you can multiply. Children can learn the Bible stories and be encouraged to tell them to others. The KIDStory strategy is easily transferrable so other leaders and children's ministries can be developed.
- **Spirit Led** ... Listen for His leading. The Holy Spirit is who brings about life transformation. Listen to Him as you prepare, facilitate and follow-up on each of the lessons.

The lessons in this book are written in conjunction with the Bible App for Kids (https://www.bible.com/kids) and Lifechurch.tv preschool curriculum (https://open.church/preschool). Both are free for you to access and use. The Bible App has various fun activities that can be used as you tell or retell the Bible Story. They also have other Bible Stories than we have here and they are continually developing more. The 24 stories are part of the preschool curriculum for Lifechurch.tv . They have other free downloadable suggestions and activities on their website.

OneHope is an international children's ministry that developed the Bible App along with YouVersion. They also have free downloadable material which you can encourage parents to follow-up with the lessons. (http://onehope.net/feature/parentresources)

These lessons can be used with any aged child but were written with the younger children in mind. The storylines are taken from the Bible App for Kids and though Biblically accurate, they are crafted so longer stories can be learned. As you get to know the group you are leading, you can determine what might work best with them. Try different things remembering to have FUN as you do! The more you get into the story and the activities, the more the children will want to participate. Let the ideas here spark your creativity to come up with other ideas that may prove to better.

KIDStory Lesson Format

The following are the different components of a KIDStory lesson. Each lesson would have these basic components that naturally lead from one to another.

- Review: It is always helpful to review previous lessons and to see if the children have applied what God showed them in the previous weeks. This way they continue to see how their story is part of God's Story and how one story is connected to the others.
- Opening: This is an opening time for people to engage with one another and to tell
 personal stories. It could be an activity or question that is not directly tied to the story but
 would start leaning people in that direction.
- **Background:** Is there a pre-story statement that you have prepared to get the people ready for the story? Is there background information they need to have to better understand the story or a transition from the last story to this one?
- **Tell the Story:** It is critical to let the audience know that the story comes from the Bible and that it is true. People should have their Bibles closed at this time and stay focused on the story and the storyteller.
- **Retell:** It is important that different activities are done so the children begin learning the story so they can re-tell it to friends and family members. If the children can read, have them re-read the story from the Bible if they have one. Someone can read the story or the leader can ask sequential questions which everyone then answers by looking at the story. You might also use other activities to engage the participants individually or as a group such as: the KIDS storyboard, a game, a song or an art activity.
- Discover & Response Questions: Asking the questions and being able to talk about the story is critical in the learning process! We are accustomed to teaching the facts about a story without talking about the feelings and the heart level. A leader should move the group from remembering some of the facts to what God is doing in their heart and life. In the Response, there should be a question or two where you are praying for the Holy Spirit to speak to each person in your group. Most curriculum have one application that the lesson is driving towards. It is different with storying. We want the Spirit to speak to each person for the implication that will be for them. It will not be uncommon to have many different responses from your group members. This is good! Follow-up in the weeks to come to see how each person is doing in their obedience to what God said.

In the Beginning



Genesis 1:1-24

Creation of the World

REVIEW

This may be your first time meeting the children in your small group. Spend some time getting to know one another. Maybe share some favorite things you each like.

OPENING

What is something you have made that you really like?

RETELL

With your Bible, go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

PERSONAL RETELL

Drawing: If you are able, have the children draw their favorite things that God has created. After doing so, go back through the story and determine which day of creation God would have made them. If drawing utensils are not available, take some things from the outdoors and make things with them or make your drawings in the dirt.

You can also assign the different days of Creation to different children and have them draw something from that day to be shared with the group.

BACKGROUND

God has always been around. He is the Almighty Creator - the King of everything. He had certain people write down all that has happened so people would know Him and learn how to follow Him. What follows is the story of how God created the world we live in. Use your imagination as we briefly tell His Story!

STORY

In the beginning, God made the heavens and the earth. God moved over the darkness and said, "Light!" He called the light "Day" and He called the darkness "Night." God said, "This is good!" Day One!

Then God made a space to separate the waters above from the waters below. He called the space "Sky." This is good! Day Two!

God gathered the waters together, and dry ground appeared. He called the ground "Land" and the waters "Seas." Then he made plants like grass, grain and trees. This is good! Day Three!

Then God made lights in the sky. He made the sun for the day, the moon for the night, and all the stars. Day Four!

TIP

Use Objects: This story has many places where you can use different objects to show as you tell the story. This helps the story be more visible to the children.

God made fish to swim in the waters and birds to fly in the sky. "Have babies," He told them. "Fill the world with splashing and singing." This is good! Day 5!

Next, God made the animals for the land. He made farm animals, wild animals and animals that crawl on the ground. "Just one more thing to make," God said, "the most special thing of all." So, in His image, God made man and woman. He made Adam from the dust of the earth and breathed life into him. Eve was made from Adam and God placed them in the Garden of Eden to live. "Have babies," He said. "Take charge of the world. Care for the fish, the birds and the animals." This is good! Day Six.

Then God looked at everything He had made. "It's very good! He said. So on the seventh day He rested and made that day special. Day Seven!

The First Sin



Genesis 3:1-24

The Fall

REVIEW

- 1. See if any of the children can retell the Creation story.
- 2. Who retold the story to someone else? Let them share what happened.
- 3. How did the children respond to the Holy Spirit's leading from last week?

OPENING

Share a time when you really wanted to do something but you knew someone would get mad if you did it.

RETELL

With your Bible, go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

PERSONAL RETELL

Rope game: Get a piece of rope that is 15 feet long and tie the ends together. Have the children get in a circle with each one holding on to the rope. Start moving the rope in one direction. When you say "STOP," the person closest to the knot has to say the next part of the story. When you say "GO" the children start moving the rope till you say "STOP."

BACKGROUND

There are a couple of things that will be helpful for the children to know for this lesson. One of the most powerful angels that God created, along with some other angels, started a war against God. God is more powerful than anything and sent this angel, the devil, out of Heaven. The devil, or sometimes known as Satan, is always trying to get people to disobey God. When God first created Adam and Eve, there was just one thing that He asked them to obey. They were not to eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

STORY

The first man and woman, Adam and Eve, lived in a beautiful garden that God made for them. But Satan came as a crafty serpent and tempted Adam and Eve. "Did God say you must not eat the fruit from these trees?" the serpent asked Eve. "Just the tree in the middle," Eve replied. "If we eat from it, we'll die."

You won't die!" said the serpent. "There's a reason why God doesn't want you to eat from that tree. If you do, you'll be like Him. You'll know what He knows!"

Eve ate the fruit. She gave some to Adam, who was with her. He ate it, too. And at once, they knew things they had never known before. One thing they knew was that they did not have clothes on! They sewed leaves together to cover themselves. They'd never felt fear or shame before, so they knew something was wrong.

TIP

When you craft a story, sometimes you might choose to not tell certain parts of the story. Things like long lists of names and lots of places may distract the children from the main part of the story. When you do this you still want to stay Biblically accurate.

Genesis 3:1-24 THE FIRST SIN

"Adam!" God called. "Eve!"

"We're hiding," Adam said. "We're naked." "You know that because you ate from the tree," God sighed.

Then Adam blamed Eve and Eve blamed the serpent. God said, "Serpent, you must crawl on your belly. A woman's son will defeat you. Eve, childbirth will be painful. Adam, growing food will be difficult." Then God made clothes for Adam and Eve and sent them out of the garden. He put an angel with a flaming sword there so they could not return.

Two by Two



Genesis 6:5-9:17

Noah's Ark

REVIEW

- 1. See if any of the children can retell previous stories told.
- 2. Who retold any previous stories to someone else? Let them share what happened.
- 3. How did the children respond to the Holy Spirit's leading from previous weeks?

OPENING

Have each child share what their favorite animal is and which one they are the most scared of.

RETELL

With your Bible, go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

PERSONAL RETELL

Act it Out: Assign different characters of the story to each of the children. Let them practice before actually acting out the story. See if there are one or two children who want to be the person telling the story while the other children act it out.

BACKGROUND

See how many children have seen a rainbow in the sky. Let them describe what they had seen. Let them know that they are going to discover when the first rainbow appeared in the sky so to listen carefully.

STORY

The earth filled up with people, but they sinned so much that God was sorry He had made them. He decided to send a flood to wash away everyone on earth. There was a man named Noah who wasn't like the others. Noah loved God and obeyed Him. God decided to save Noah and his family from the flood.

God warned Noah about the flood. He told him to build an enormous boat with a low roof, three decks, a window and a door. In obedience, Noah built it. God told Noah to collect two of every kind of animal. One male, one female. Then Noah, his family and the animals went into the boat. God shut the door.

TIP

Using objects in the telling of your story will help bring the story to life. There do not have to be too many nor very elaborate, but doing so will help the lesson come to life.

It rained for 40 days and nights. Water fell from the sky and rose from the oceans and lakes. Even the tallest mountains disappeared beneath the flood. Meanwhile, Noah, his family and all the animals were safe in the boat, floating on the floodwaters. God had not forgotten Noah, not even for a moment.

God sent a wind to blow. The waters went down. The boat rested on mountain where Noah sent out a dove. When it didn't return, he knew it was safe. When the ground was dry, God told them to come out. He put a rainbow in the sky as a promise that He would never flood the whole earth again.

Abraham's Big Test



Genesis 15:1-6; 21:1-7; 22:1-19

Abraham and Isaac

REVIEW

- 1. See if any of the children can retell previous stories told.
- 2. Who retold any previous stories to someone else? Let them share what happened.
- 3. How did the children respond to the Holy Spirit's leading from previous weeks?

OPENING

What is something that is really special to you? What would you do if you had to share it with someone though you really did not want to? How would you feel and what would you do if they broke it?!

RETELL

With your Bible, go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

PERSONAL RETELL

Pantomime: Divide the group into several smaller groups. Have one group act out the first part of the story without using words. The other groups have to say what is happening. The next group has to act out the next part of the story and the remaining groups tell what is happening. Continue till the story is retold. You may remind the group acting out the story if they don't remember what the next part is.

BACKGROUND

God choose a man named Abraham, that he and the children he would have - and the children they would have - to start a nation that God would bless and God would call His special people. These families that would come from Abraham are called descendants. Abraham was very old when God made a promise to him about having a son that these families would come from. He was 75 when God first told Abraham and this promise came true 25 years later!! Abraham was known as God's friend because he trusted and obeyed God. Also know that a sacrifice is giving up something very special to you

STORY

God promised Abraham a son and from that son many descendants would come who would bless the whole world. But Abraham and his wife, Sarah, were too old to have children. Twenty five years went by. Still, Abraham trusted God's promise. When he was 99 and Sarah was 89, God reminded them of His promise. Sarah was going to have a baby!

When Sarah heard this, she laughed! "I am too old to have a baby!" God heard her laugh and told them to name their son, Isaac which means, "he laughs."

When Isaac was a boy, God tested Abraham by telling him to take Isaac to Mount Moriah and give him as a sacrifice to God. Abraham was confused but still be trusted God. Isaac carried the wood and Abraham held the knife and the torch. Together they climbed the mountain.

TIP

WORDS: Make sure to use words that the children will know and define the ones that might be unfamiliar to them. Because this lesson is for younger children, we used the word "sacrifice" instead of "kill" and defined it in the Introduction.

"Where is the lamb for the sacrifice?" asked Isaac. "God will provide it," Abraham replied.

Abraham arranged the wood on an altar, tied up Isaac and laid him on the wood. As he raised the knife to kill Isaac, an angel called his name: "Abraham! Don't hurt the boy! God knows you trust His promise. Look, there in the bushes. A ram is caught by its horns. Sacrifice that instead."

So Abraham sacrificed the ram instead of his son. He called the place "God will Provide," because God provided the sacrifice. Just as God had said, His promise came true.

Joseph is Sold Into Slavery

REVIEW

- 1. See if any of the children can retell previous stories told.
- 2. Who retold any previous stories to someone else? Let them share what happened.
- 3. How did the children respond to the Holy Spirit's leading from previous weeks?

OPENING

Describe a dream that you have had.

RETELL

With your Bible, go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

PERSONAL RETELL

Drawing: If you have the materials, have the children draw what they saw or what they liked best as the story was being told. Have each child share their pictures with the rest of the group. If there are different scenes from the story, have the children put them in the order that they occurred.

BACKGROUND

Isaac grows up, gets married and has a family of his own. He has two sons named Jacob and Esau. Jacob receives the blessing from Isaac and he too, grows up and has his own family. Joseph is one of the last sons to be born to Isaac.

STORY

Jacob had 12 sons, but he loved his son Joseph the most. He gave Joseph a special, brightly colored coat. Joseph's brothers were jealous of him. They hated him. Joseph also had special dreams. "In my dream we were tying up bundles of wheat and your bundles bowed down to mine!" Joseph told them. Joseph's brothers hated him even more.

Joseph had another dream. "The sun, the moon and 11 stars bowed down before me." His father and brothers grumbled. "Are you saying you will rule over us?"

One day, Joseph's brothers were in the fields watching their sheep. They saw him coming to see them. They planned to kill him and put an end to all his dreams. "It would be wrong to kill our brother," said Reuben. "Let's throw him in this empty well." So they tore off Joseph's special coat and threw him into the well.

TIF

Everyone wants to be known and appreciated. There are some simple things you can do to make this possible with your children. Get to know them by name, what their interests are and simply asking what special thing happened to them this past week.

Some traders came by on their way to Egypt. "Let's sell Joseph as a slave to them!" So the brothers sold Joseph for 20 pieces of silver. The brothers dipped Joseph's coat in goat's blood and showed it to their father, Jacob. "My son is dead!" he wept. Meanwhile, Joseph was taken to Egypt. But God was with Joseph.

In Egypt, the traders sold Joseph to Potiphar, one of the Pharaoh's captains. God blessed Joseph and made him successful. Potiphar put Joseph in charge of his whole household.

Genesis 39-45

Joseph's Rise to Power

REVIEW

- 1. See if any of the children can retell previous stories told.
- 2. Who retold any previous stories to someone else? Let them share what happened.
- 3. How did the children respond to the Holy Spirit's leading from previous weeks?

OPENING

Share a time when someone was really mean to you.

RETELL

With your Bible, go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

PERSONAL RETELL

Hand Motions: Go back through the Bible story and have the group come up with different hand motions that would help them remember each part of the story. Keep going back through the story adding more hand motions until the story is retold.

BACKGROUND

Isaac had a son named Jacob and Jacob had 12 sons, his favorite being Joseph. He gave Joseph a special coat that was made of many colors. Joseph had some dreams which showed that Jacob and the other brothers would bow down to Joseph. When Joseph told them these dreams, they began to hate Joseph. One day Jacob told Joseph to go bring his brothers some lunch. They decided this was the time to get rid of Joseph and sold him as a slave to some men from Egypt. They then told their father that some animal had killed their brother and it seemed that Joseph would be separated from his family forever. God had other plans. Joseph got to be a servant of Potiphar, a leader in the Egyptian army.

STORY

Joseph served Potiphar well. Potiphar's wife wanted Joseph to sin against God. Joseph refused, so she lied about him. Potiphar believed her and Joseph was thrown into prison. In prison Joseph met two of Pharaoh's servants. They each had dreams and God showed Joseph their meaning. Joseph's explanations came true and for the cupbearer, he was released.

Two years later the Pharaoh himself had some troubling dreams. The cupbearer remembered what Joseph had done for him and told Pharaoh. So, Pharaoh sent for Joseph and told him his dreams. God showed Joseph the meaning of Pharaoh's dreams.

TIP

Leading a small group means you are being a facilitator and not just dumping information onto the children. Ask questions that lead to discussions. We often learn the best when we learn for ourselves rather than being told.

"For seven years a lot of food will grow," said Joseph. "So, store up food because seven years of famine will follow." Pharaoh was impressed by Joseph's wisdom. So he put Joseph in charge of storing up all the food! Apart from Pharaoh, no one in Egypt was more powerful than Joseph.

Joseph's brothers went to Egypt to buy food. They bowed before Joseph but did not recognize him. When he saw that they had changed, he told them who he was. The brothers were terrified for they thought Joseph would hurt them as they had done to him. "You meant to harm me," said Joseph, "but God used that for good. Bring all of your family to Egypt. We will have plenty to eat!"

REVIEW

- 1. See if any of the children can retell previous stories told.
- 2. Who retold any previous stories to someone else? Let them share what happened.
- 3. How did the children respond to the Holy Spirit's leading from previous weeks?

OPENING

Share a time when you were able to take care of someone or someone took care of you.

RETELL

With your Bible, go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

PERSONAL RETELL

Ball Game: Several different games can be played with a ball. Have the children get in a circle. When you say "GO," or start playing the music, the children pass the ball around the circle until you say "STOP" or stop the music. When that happens, the person who has the ball has to say the next part of the story. When you say "GO" or start the music, the children start passing the ball till you say "STOP."

BACKGROUND

A long time ago, the country of Egypt had leaders they called Pharaoh. They were like a King or our President. The people who were followers of God, the Israelites, lived in Egypt for a long time and now there was a Pharaoh that was very mean to the people and treated them very badly. God was hearing their cries for help and was getting someone ready to help get them free and away from all the terrible things that were happening.

STORY

Egypt was filled with Israelites. The new Pharaoh was afraid that they would become too powerful. So he made them slaves and treated them very badly. Pharaoh ordered that all baby Israelite boys had to be killed. One woman put her baby in a basket and hid him by the river's edge. His sister watched him. The Pharaoh's daughter was bathing by the river where she found the baby and decided to keep him. His sister offered their mother's help to care for him. Pharaoh's daughter named him Moses.

At the age of twelve he stayed at the Temple and got into conversations with the religious leaders instead of leaving Jerusalem with his family. BACKGROUND

Every country in the world has leaders to follow, laws to obey and common ways that we treat one another. God has a Kingdom that is in Heaven. He wants us to follow Him, His law is to love Him, others and ourselves. That is how we are to treat one another - with love. God wants us to take the ways of the Kingdom of Heaven and live according to them here where we are right now. To teach us how to live this way, Jesus often told stories, called parables. Here is one that He told about living as people of His Kingdom.

STORY

OPENING

Choose some children to have disabilities (blindness, can't walk, can't use their arms, can't speak, deaf, etc) and the other children have to help them do something. Have the children share what it was like to have a disability and the other children share what it was like to help them.

RETELL

With your Bible, go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

PERSONAL RETELL

Art Attack: Use paper and coloring markers that are available. if the paper is big enough, have the children work on a poster that tells the story. if you only have single sheets, have each child draw a different part of the story or their favorite part of the story and share it with the class.

BACKGROUND

Jesus has been teaching the people about how to follow God. They are amazed at what He is saying. Sick people are coming to him and Jesus prays for them and they become better. Listen carefully to the story about Jesus healing a man that could not walk.

STORY

At once the man jumped up, picked up his mat, and went home and the whole time he was praising God! All the people were fully amazed and began to praise God too. They were filled with much wonder and awe and said, "Today we have seen amazing things!"

BACKGROUND

TIP

The #1 reason why a speaker is boring is their voice. If it is always monotone with no changes in pitch and volume, the participants will soon be bored and not listen. Use your voice to engage the children and get them into God's Story. It is one way to make the story come alive in their minds and hearts.

TIE

TIP

KIDStory is a natural way to develop leaders. When you have someone who is a potential leader, even a child, have them lead the Opening time. After doing this a few times, have them develop and present the Background. Then they might be ready to learn and tell different Bible stories. After this, work with them on leading the discussion time. With continual encouragement and coaching they can potentially lead their own group.

BACKGROUND

The religious leaders are jealous of how many people are following Jesus and not them. Start moving the rope in one direction. When you say "STOP," the person closest to the knot has to say the next part of the story. When you say "GO" the children start moving the rope till you say "STOP."

BACKGROUND

It has been a very hard week for everyone. It started with what seemed like a parade honoring Jesus but by Friday he is made to die on a cross and then he is buried. Jesus has told his followers that he would die and then come back to life but everyone is very sad because he is gone.

One of the things that families and friends would do after a person had died and was buried was to put special spices on the body. It is now Sunday and some women are going to where Jesus is buried to do this for him. Now remember that a disciple is a follower - a student - of the teacher. Let's see how they are doing.

STORY

Sunday morning, some women went to put burial spices on Jesus' body. They knew a big stone was covering the tomb's entrance and wondered how they would move it. When they arrived, the stone had already been rolled away, Jesus' body was gone, and there were angels in the tomb!

"Jesus is alive!" the angels said. "Go tell His disciples."

TIP

TIP

It is good to start developing leadership skills in the children. The KIDStory strategy makes that possible. Ask a child to come up with the Opening question. After a few weeks of doing that, have them research and allow them to tell the Background. When you feel they are ready, have them tell the Bible Story. It will mean a lot of work on their part but it begins the process of raising up leaders within your ministry.

That's when Cornelius' messengers arrived. So Peter and some others went with them to Caesarea. Cornelius' house was filled with his friends and family, eager to hear Peter speak.

"God showed me, in a vision, that He accepts people from every nation. God sent Jesus to everyone. He is Lord of all. He healed the sick and freed the oppressed.

"He was crucified, and then raised from the dead. Everyone who believes in him will be forgiven of their sins." The Holy Spirit came upon them, just like Pentecost. Peter baptized them.

REVIEW

- 1. See if any of the children can retell previous stories told.
- 2. Who retold any previous stories to someone else? Let them share what happened.

OPENING

If I could tell you something important about myself, I would tell you ...

RETELL

With your Bible, go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

PERSONAL RETELL

Ball Game: Several different games can be played with a ball. Have the children get in a circle. When you say "GO," or start playing the music, the children pass the ball around the circle until you say "STOP" or stop the music. When that happens, the person who has the ball has to say the next part of the story. When you say "GO" or start the music, the children start passing the ball till you say "STOP."

BACKGROUND

We have learned a lot about God, about people and about ourselves through the different Bible Stories. All these stories together tell the big story of God's love and the sending of His Son, Jesus. God's desire is that everyone know Him and to trust and follow Him. Let's hear one more time God's great plan.

STORY

In the beginning, God made everything! He made it perfect. He made us, too, in His image. He loves us and wants to have a relationship with us.

Sadly, Adam and Eve disobeyed God. That sin brought death into the world and broke our relationship with God. It also broke God's perfect world.

Sin spread throughout the whole world. Everyone sins, and the result of sin is death. But sin couldn't stop God from loving us. He had a plan!

Because of His love for us, God sent His Son, Jesus, into the world. Sin broke our relationship with God, but Jesus came to fix it!

TIP

Don't be afraid to share stories of what God is and has done in your life. You don't want to dominate the discussions but when appropriate it is good for the children to relate to you as one who has victories and struggles and how God works during those times.

Three days later, Jesus rose from the dead, breaking the power of sin and death! He spent time with His followers, teaching them. Then He returned to Heaven. Now Jesus lives forever!

Jesus did not leave us alone. He sent His Holy Spirit to live inside everyone who trusts Him. The Spirit gives us power to live the way God created us to live.

One day, when Jesus returns, God will make everything perfect again. He will make a New Heaven and a New Earth. Everyone who trusts in Jesus will live with Him, forever!

God loves you. He created you one-of-a-kind! Trusting and following Jesus fixes our broken relationship with God! Are you ready to be a part of God's story?

CLOSING BLESSING

DIFFERENT WAYS TO TELL THE STORY

Though it is critical to keep true to God's Word, it is okay to tell the story in different ways as the Holy Spirit leads you. Utilizing storytelling techniques makes the story come alive and possibly seem more realistic. Try different methods and encourage others to do the same as they have opportunity to tell or retell the Bible Stories.

- Audience Participation: There are many ways in which the audience can be actively involved in the telling of your story. They can act it out as you tell it, they can produce sound effects, do the actions, repeat reoccurring words or phrases
- **Senses:** God has given us the ability to see, hear, touch, taste and smell. Use these to enhance your lessons. You can have objects to see and touch, food to smell and taste, sound effects to hear. Let the Lord inspire you on how to bring the body's senses to your storytelling.
- Different Perspectives: Take on the role of someone in the story and tell it through their eyes and emotions. Remember to stay true to what God has written and not embellish on what you think or feel. Using accents and changing one's voice could make it more fun without making it more complex.
- **Objects:** Many people are visual so to have an object that is found in the story could be very helpful in keeping kids focused and bringing the story to life.
- Multi-Media: Powerpoints, video clips, KIDS Storyboard Sets, puppets and internet sites could
 enhance the story. Some of these might be great resources for the retell so the accurate telling of
 the story is not compromised.
- Move: Don't feel that you or your group needs to stay in your seats. As you tell the story, move
 around the room and engage with your group in the different elements of the story. Move your
 face give expressions to what is being said and done with the different Bible characters. Don't be
 afraid to move your group to different locations to enhance and bring to life the story you are
 telling.

Ideas to Retell the Story

Children learn and remember in various ways. When doing the retell, use a different, but appropriate, activity each week to not only keep the element of fun and wonder, but to engage each of the children. Remember to use the Multiple Intelligence chart (pg) when you want to use a variety of activities.

ART

- Graffiti Wall: As a group, have the children write words or draw pictures which tell the story.
- Personal drawing: The children draw a color a picture of the part of the story they liked best.
- Tee Shirt Design: have each child design the front of a tee shirt that could tell the major parts of the story
- Pipe Cleaners & Play Doh/Clay: use these or other available craft items to build and retell the story
- Billboard: Design a roadside billboard of the Bible story or how you see yourself connecting with it.
- Pictionary: different parts of the story are given out and the person needs to draw it till someone guesses what it is.

DRAMA

- Act-it-Out: Assign different parts of the story to children in the group. Have them practice and then act out the story to the rest of the group.
- KIDS Storyboards: using the different flannel characters, have the children retell the story by posting the figures on the storyboard
- Charades: Without using words, the kids act out the different scenes while the audience has to guess which part of the story they are doing.
- Re-read the Bible story and come up with different sound effects and/or motions for words or actions that repeat throughout the story.
- Object(s) (ie: scarf, rope), See how many times they can use the object to tell the story. Another way is to give each group 3 different objects and they have to use them in retelling the story.
- Use different motions to illustrate each segment of the story. You can assign one motion to each child or small group and they need to demonstrate their motion in the order in which it comes in the story
- Human Slide Show: You will need a big cloth to use as a curtain. Two children will can hold it up and then drop it when you tell them. Pick several children to be the characters in the story. For each story segment, while the curtain is up, have the children get into a position as though there were a picture or painting of that part of the story. They are to remain perfectly still and then have the cloth dropped so the rest of the group can see it. Each scene changes as you tell the story.
- Puppets: Create simple puppets from things like socks, paper plates, paper cups, sticks, etc and retell the story using these characters.

GAMES

- Beach Ball: certain key questions for any Bible story can be written on a beach ball with a permanent marker. Wherever the child catches the ball is the question they need to answer. Ones used in the Discovery Questions are:
 - What did you wonder about as the story was being told?
 - What part of the story did you really like? What did you like about it?
 - Was there anything that was difficult or hard to understand?
 - What choices did the people make? What else could they have done? What happened because of the choices they made?
 - Something I learned about God is What difference will this make in how you love and live for (serve) Him?
 - Do you want to know God like this? Is there something happening right now in your life where God could help you?
 - Circle Toss: A ball or other soft object is tossed throughout the small group and the person who has been tossed the ball needs to tell the next thing that happened in the Bible story.
 - Timer: Use a watch, someone counting or an egg timer and see how much of the Bible story the group can tell in the allotted amount of time.
 - Knot You: Take a 5 yard piece of rope and tie it together to make a circle. Have the kids grab onto the rope. At your command, the kids move the rope clockwise and when you say, "Stop," whoever has the knot has to answer a question you have about the Bible story or tell what happened next in the story.
 - Story Cards: Write or draw the different segments of the Bible story on separate sheets of paper. Give them to different children in the class and have the children get in order of the story line. You could also give them a certain amount of time to do it in or write out 2 or more copies of the story line and have several groups of children trying to be the first group to finish.
 - Sign Language: Pretend as though you and the person you are trying to tell the story to are deaf. What would that look like?

MUSIC

- Rap Review: Have the kids create a rap to the main events of the story.
- New Lyrics to a Familiar Song: Have the children pick a simple children's song and change the words so the Bible story is being told through a song.
- Rhythm: Have the group come up with a beat and then tell the story as you do the beat
- Dance: create a dance that would tell the story. Put some background music to it

WRITING

- Storybooks: the story is retold by the child through pictures and/or words in a storybook (or comic) format
- Journals: the children are given the opportunity to just quietly sit and journal what was in the story and what it meant to them.
- Top Ten: have the kids, either as a group or individually, write out the top ten events of the story.
- Have each child write out what God wants them to do with what they heard in the story
- Comparisons: Have each child pick one of the characters in the story that was told. Have them
 draft a chart that expresses how they are similar and how they are different than the Bible
 Character.

Activities for Discover & Response Questions

Listed below are some different ways to add some interactive activities during the time of asking questions and having your discussion.

- Rubber Band: Pass a rubber band around and have kids answer the question: "How does today's Bible story stretch you to become more like Jesus?"
- Book Cover: "If you could design a book cover from your response to today's lesson, what title would you give the book and what picture would you put on it?"
- Road Signs: Have kids respond to the Bible story based on various road signs. Some examples are:
 - Stop: "What does God want you to stop doing?"
 - U-turn: "Something or someone I need to go back to is..."
 - Yield: "An area where I need to yield to God is..."
 - Hospital: "Who is someone that needs your help right now?"
 - Merge: "Someone who can come alongside me right now is..." or "Someone the Holy Spirit
 is prompting me to come alongside right now is ______ and this is what I believe I need to
 do..."
- Newspaper Headline: "In a newspaper headline, summarize what you learned about God or how you connected to the story."
- Pass the Gem: Have something "precious" that you could have the kids pass around for those that want to answer the question: "What was the treasure you received from the lesson today?"
- Deck of Cards: Deal out one or more cards to each person in your group. The suit of each card describes the response each person needs to make:
 - Heart = feeling you had from the lesson
 - Diamond = something important to you
 - Spade = something you feel God would have you do from what you have learned
 - Club = Something you want to pass on to some one else
- Tee Shirt Design: "How would you let others know what God means to you after hearing today's story?"
