The materials and lessons in this manual are based on a strategy called KIDStory, which equips leaders to create environments where kids can encounter the love of Jesus through the telling of His Story and the working of His Spirit. This method focuses on students learning individual stories throughout the Bible and discovering how they apply, uniquely, to each of our lives.

We realize that a time comes when a child, and their faith, matures. Bigger questions arise and deeper conversations are needed surrounding the overarching themes we find from Genesis to Revelation. Can students deeply and truly know God and His character? Can students deeply and truly understand the major themes of the Bible? We think so and we've partnered with our friends at The Bible Project to help connect these individual stories in a manner that helps people experience the Bible as a UNIFIED STORY that leads to Jesus.

We are calling this next step KIDStory+ and through these resources, and our partnership, we believe the tools you will discover here will revolutionize the next steps for your maturing students. *If you are unfamiliar with the core KIDStory Strategy, we encourage you to begin with any of our early training offerings: Online, In-Person or Self-Study*. These strategies are fun to learn, easy to use and designed to be shared with others. Leaders listen rather than lecture ... listen to the Holy Spirit and the responses of their students, then encourage them to also listen and be obedient to God's voice. The questions and interactions posed by the leaders are not about simply learning information; rather they focus on facilitate Holy Spirit transformation of the heart and mind. KIDStory is about God transforming a life, a family and ultimately a community through His Story and His Spirit.

A StoryClub is a place where students have fun and are free to ask real questions, connect dots and share what they are learning and experiencing; a place where God's presence is very real and evident. It's here that we leave behind rote learning concepts and step toward an approach that thrives on dialog, fun activities and is anchored in genuine relationships. It's where everyone feels safe, feels known and feels accepted and do likewise for others. StoryClubs are also a safe place for parents and leaders to learn and grow in how to lead young believers spiritually and have deeper conversations – a place where people are consistently equipped & encouraged.

A StoryClub can meet wherever and whenever is most convenient and leaders can even give it their own name. What makes a StoryClub unique is the application of the 5 Core Essentials. In a StoryClub, the stories of the Bible are linked together in fun, creative ways, while being Biblically accurate. As important as it is to see God's unified story, it is not enough. It's also about listening – listening to the Spirit and listening to a student reveal how the Spirit is stirring their heart.

The methods used to tell and retell God's unified story are coupled with engaging questions that allow the Holy Spirit to operate in every heart. It capitalizes on what students have heard and learned, creating a discovery process, bringing about true life change. The questions posed by leaders are not just for retention, but for transformation of the heart and mind, leading to real life application. Fostering this kind of environment provides leaders the opportunity to follow up on the things the Holy Spirit is teaching and revealing.

We are thrilled to work alongside the amazing scholars, storytellers & artists of The Bible Project, (<u>bibleproject.com</u>) who created each of the "overview" videos that will open and close each series. - Justice
- Gospel of the Kingdom
- The Messiah
- The Image of God
- Generosity

So, WELCOME!!! We pray the Lord opens up many doors for you to create environments where students grow deeper in their faith and their understanding of God, His Son, and the enduring hope each of us is offered through our relationship with Him.

Series Format for KIDStory+

Initial Week:

- Briefly introduce the concept you will be exploring
- Identify how many Sessions you'll do together during the Series
- · Show students The Bible Project video
- · Introduce the Key Verse for the Series
- Conduct Session 1 for that Series

Each Series will open & close with a video from The Bible Project. These videos are created to provide an overview of a larger narrative in the Bible, & each Session will explore a specific story in the Bible where we see this clearly illustrated.

Middle Sessions:

- Briefly discuss what they remember & significant elements from The Bible Project video & previous Session
- Conduct next Session

Each Series will include 4-5 total Sessions that link together, highlighting a specific theological or thematical element of God's unified story, pointing to Jesus. As you explore each Session, ensure the students are connecting the thread that runs through them all.

Final Week:

- Briefly discuss what they remember & significant elements from the overview video & previous Session
- Conduct the final Session
- Watch The Bible Project video one more time
- Conduct the Series Closing Mini-Session
- Revisit the Key Verse for the Series

As you complete each Series, you will revisit The Bible Project video & facilitate some connecting questions to help the students discover where they see God & Jesus moving, & what the Holy Spirit is calling them to do.

Opening:

- Choose a question or activity where students can share a personal story
- The answer should generate an emotion from the students
- Ask a question that needs an answer more than "Yes" or "No"

Background:

- Define words or explain geographical locations & cultural differences that may not be known
- Explain important events that happened before today's story
- Review important concepts from the previous story if applicable

Tell the Story:

- Involve the students in the story
- Use dramatic elements that would make the story more engaging & interactive
- Use visual objects to show the group if possible
- Keep the length of the story appropriate for the students to learn so they can tell others

Retell:

- Have students use their Bibles to read & retell
 the story
- Choose a game or activity to engage the students

Discover & Response Questions:

- Pray about this lesson regarding where the Holy Spirit might lead the discussion
- Use questions that engage the heart & not just the head

The Opening doesn't have to be directly tied to the Bible story but gets the students thinking in that direction.

You don't want to stop during the story to explain words so make sure to go over them all in the Background time.

Tell the story just as it is in the Bible. Don't add your own words or interpretations. Make it memorable but stay true to God's Word. It is crucial that the students know that the story comes from the Bible & that it is true.

Make sure the students are being Biblically accurate when retelling the story.

Move the students from remembering facts in the story to what God is doing in their hearts & lives. We want the Spirit to speak to each person for the implication that will be for them specifically.

Generosity Series Overview for Facilitators & Parents

We will be using a few helpful tools that connect in meaningful ways, so understanding the BIG PICTURE will help you engage the students each week more deeply. We encourage you to read through this one-page overview to better grasp where we are starting and where we hope to land.

We have constructed the series to resemble a snorkeling excursion. As we swim across the surface of the waters, at times we see specific things that can tell us more about the environment we are exploring. In order to understand it better, we dive down and take a peek. Then we swim back to the surface, catch our breath and keep swimming until we find the next thing to dive deep on and that's exactly our plan. Over the next six weeks we will dive into the stories below, in hopes of better understanding GENEROSITY. These may be familiar stories to you or your students, but our hope is that linking them together in this manner will create space for new engagement, deep conversation, and thoughtful questions!

Within the Generosity Series, you will notice some sub-themes in the Discover Questions:

- Scarcity vs abundance mentality: Some believe they can't be generous because they don't have anything to give. When we start understanding who we are in Jesus Christ and our inheritance as His children, we recognize the great abundance we have to offer.
- Generosity Heroes: A hero helps others be better; they are known for their courageous acts. Through these lessons, children will recognize their ability to be heroes through their time, talents, treasures and the power of God working through them.
- Some Biblical principles outlined by Generosity Path (<u>https://www.generositypath.org</u>) have been incorporated into the lessons. Generosity Path is a global network who creates experiences to help people discover the great joy of giving. Their philosophy of teaching and facilitating discussions, along with their Biblical view on generosity, is why we include their Core Messages to be cycled through the series:
 - 1. God gave first: John 3:16, Romans 5:8
 - 2. Giving is a heart issue: Matthew 6:21
 - 3. God owns it all: Psalm 24:1
 - 4. Seek first the Kingdom of God: Matthew 6:33
 - 5. Heaven, not earth, is my home: Philippians 3:20
 - 6. Giving brings joy: Acts 20:35

It's not about how much – it's all about the heart behind what we give.

Week 12 – Sent Out to Be a World Changer (Mark 6:7-13)

Doing Jesus' work requires faith, trust and obedience - not just our stuff!

Week 13 – Extending Forgiveness Generously (Genesis 45:4-11, 14-15)

When are hearts are right before God, we can have His perspective and forgive generously.

The Generosity Theme is: *Gladly giving to make it better for someone else.*

Our series verse will be: Matthew 10:8: As freely as you have received, freely give.



GENEROSITY SERIES:

Gladly giving to make it better for someone else.

GENEROSITY STARTS WITH GOD Genesis 1-2 (summarized)

- 1. OPENING: What is something really special you made for someone else?
- 2. BACKGROUND: a brief explanation of what led up to today's story

This is the first story in our Generosity series. Generosity means: *Gladly giving to make it better for someone else.* There are many things you can give, it doesn't just have to be money or things we own. It could be your time. It could be using what you are really good at and helping someone with that talent. It could be just letting God, through His Holy Spirit, work through you to do something really good for someone. It might be as simple as sharing words of encouragement. God is the One who is most generous! He has given us everything we need to live. Let's discover how all that got started.

3. TELL: use added expression, vocal fluctuation or body language to help tell today's story

As God spoke, creation began to take shape. God made light by pushing back the darkness. Then God separated the sky from the oceans and the seas. He then gathered the waters together so there could be dry land.

God made plants, flowers and trees to grow on the land.

Then God made the sun, moon and the stars in all the galaxies.

God then filled the earth with all kinds of living creatures: birds to fly in the sky, fish to swim in the waters and all kinds of animals to roam the land.

When God looked at what He created, He said: "This is good!"

Then God created a man to be made in His image – to be like Him. This man will take care of and rule over the earth and everything that lives there. So God took dirt from the earth and formed the first man. God breathed into his nose and the man came to life! He would later be known as Adam. God even brought each kind of animal right to Adam so he could give them names!

Soon, God said to Adam, "It's not good for you to be alone. I'll make a partner just for you." So God caused Adam to fall into a deep sleep, removed one of his ribs, and used this rib to create the first woman. When God brought her to Adam, Adam shouted, "At last!" Adam would call her Eve. Adam and Eve were joined together as husband and wife.

Every day God would come and walk with them.

After creating all of this, God thought, "This is excellent in every way!" Then God rested and set aside a day in each week for people to rest and enjoy being with God.

Group Poster: If you have the materials, have the children work together on making a poster that can tell the Bible Story. Allow the children to retell the story by using what they drew on the poster.

Rope Game: Get a piece of rope that is 15 feet long and tie the ends together. Have the children get in a circle with everyone holding on to the rope. Start moving the rope in one direction. When you say "STOP," the person closest to the knot has to say the next part of the story. Continue doing this till the story is told.

People have been waiting for thousands of years for God to send a Savior, the One who would free them from their sins. They kept waiting not knowing exactly when that time would come. They just knew they needed to be ready. The prophets, those people who speak for God, continue to tell the people to trust and follow the Lord. The people start to but then they stop. God decides to be silent for 400 years. Then an angel appears to a young lady named Mary, who is engaged to be married to a man named Joseph. God tells Mary that she is going to have a baby – a baby from God Himself. They are to name him Jesus. Mary and Joseph had to go to Bethlehem just when it was time for the baby to be born. God is always the first to give.

3. TELL: use added expression, vocal fluctuation or body language to help tell today's story

That night, some shepherds were in the fields nearby watching their sheep. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them. The glory of the Lord was shining around them, and they became very frightened. The angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I am bringing you good news that will be a great joy to all the people.

Today your Savior was born in the town of David. He is Christ, the Lord. This is how you will know him: You will find a baby wrapped in pieces of cloth and lying in a feeding box."

Then a very large group of angels from heaven joined the first angel, praising God and saying: "Give glory to God in heaven, and on earth let there be peace among the people who please God."

When the angels left them and went back to heaven, the shepherds said to each other, "Let's go to Bethlehem. Let's see this thing that has happened which the Lord has told us about."

So the shepherds went quickly and found Mary and Joseph and the baby, who was lying in a feeding trough. When they had seen him, they told what the angels had said about this child. Everyone was amazed at what the shepherds said to them.

But Mary treasured these things and continued to think about them. Then the shepherds went back to their sheep, praising God and thanking him for everything they had seen and heard. It had been just as the angel had told them.

Story Comic Strip: Give each child a sheet of paper. Have them fold it in half, then fold that half again and then a third time. When you open the paper, there should be 8 boxes on the paper. For each scene or action in the Bible story, have each child draw a simple picture or object in each box in the order that it happens in the story. Let the children retell the story to a partner by using their comic strips.

Act it Out: Assign different characters of the story to each of the children. Let them practice before actually acting out the story. See if there are one or two children who want to be the person telling the story while the other children act it out.

Gladly giving to make it better for someone else.

1. OPENING: Tell us about a person that is hard to get along with.

2. BACKGROUND: a brief explanation of what led up to today's story

We find different people were trying to trick Jesus by asking him difficult questions. Jesus always had the right answer for them. Now during this time, the Samaritans and the Jewish people did not get along – they were enemies. A lawyer comes and asks a question to test Jesus. Let's see how Jesus responds.

3. TELL: use added expression, vocal fluctuation or body language to help tell today's story

Then an expert on the law stood up to test Jesus, saying, "Teacher, what must I do to get life forever?"

Jesus said, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?"

The man answered, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your strength, and all your mind." Also, "Love your neighbor as you love yourself."

Jesus said to him, "Your answer is right. Do this and you will live."

But the man, wanting to show the importance of his question, said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

Jesus answered, "As a man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, some robbers attacked him. They tore off his clothes, beat him, and left him lying there, almost dead. It happened that a priest was going down that road. When he saw the man, he walked by on the other side. Next, a Levite came there, and after he went over and looked at the man, he walked by on the other side of the road.

Then a Samaritan traveling down the road came to where the hurt man was. When he saw the man, he felt very sorry for him. The Samaritan went to him, poured olive oil and wine on his wounds, and bandaged them.

Then he put the hurt man on his own donkey and took him to an inn where he cared for him. The next day, the Samaritan brought out two coins, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of this man. If you spend more money on him, I will pay it back to you when I come again.'"

Then Jesus said, "Which one of these three men do you think was a neighbor to the man who was attacked by the robbers?"

The expert on the law answered, "The one who showed him mercy."

Hand Motions: Go back through the Bible story and have the group come up with different hand motions that would help them remember each part of the story. Keep going back through the story adding more hand motions until the story is retold.

Rope Game: Get a piece of rope that is 15 feet long and tie the ends together. Have the children get in a circle with everyone holding on to the rope. Start moving the rope in one direction. - 1. **OPENING:** What is something really important to you that would be more difficult to share?
- 2. BACKGROUND: a brief explanation of what led up to today's story

Jesus has been teaching the people and doing a lot of miracles. He is making people well and commanding the demons to leave. The people love his teachings. He is now trying to get away for a while to be alone with his disciples, or sometimes called the apostles, the men he has chosen to follow him. A large crowd of people still figure out where he is going.

3. TELL: use added expression, vocal fluctuation or body language to help tell today's story

Jesus took the apostles away with him so they could be alone together. But the people learned where Jesus went and followed him.

He welcomed them and talked with them about God's kingdom and healed those who needed to be healed.

Late in the afternoon, the twelve apostles came to Jesus and said, "Send the people away. They need to go to the towns and countryside around here and find places to sleep and something to eat, because no one lives in this place." But Jesus said to them, "You give them something to eat."

They said, "We only have five loaves of bread and two fish from this boy, and it would take a whole year's wages to buy food for all these people," for there were about five thousand men there. Jesus had the disciples sit everyone down on the grass.

Then he took the five loaves of bread and two fish, and looking up to heaven, he thanked God for the food.

Then he divided the food and gave it to the followers to give to the people. They all ate and were satisfied, and what was left over was gathered up, filling twelve baskets.

Tee Shirt Design: Have each child design the front of a tee shirt that could tell the major parts of the story. **Tingo Tingo Tango**: Have the children get into a circle. Pass an object around as you are saying "Tingo, Tingo, Tango." When you get to "Tango," whoever has the ball has to say the next part of the story. Vary the amount of time between the words so the children do not know who will be next.

Jesus was going through the city of Jericho. A man was there named Zacchaeus, who was a very important tax collector, and he was wealthy. He wanted to see who Jesus was, but he was not able because he was too short to see above the crowd.

He ran ahead to a place where Jesus would come, and he climbed a sycamore tree so he could see him. When Jesus came to that place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down! I must stay at your house today."

Zacchaeus came down quickly and welcomed him gladly. All the people saw this and began to complain, "Jesus is staying with a sinner!" But Zacchaeus stood and said to the Lord, "I will give half of my possessions to the poor.

And if I have cheated anyone, I will pay back four times more." Jesus said to him, "Salvation has come to this house today, because this man also belongs to the family of Abraham. The Son of Man came to find lost people and save them."

Musical Chairs: Put enough chairs in a circle for each person in your group except one. The chairs should be facing out. Everyone gets to sit in the chair except the one person remaining. Jesus has gone back to Heaven and the Holy Spirit has come to be inside the disciples. Peter has just told the people about Jesus and 3000 of them believed in Jesus and were baptized. This was the first church. How did the first Christians live and treat one another? How were they Generosity Heroes?

The Israelites have been slaves in Egypt for 400 years. God sends Moses to free the people and through many miracles of God, the Pharaoh lets the people go. They are now wandering around in the desert but have no food or water. They begin to grumble and complain to their leader, Moses. They want to go back to Egypt as they at least had food to eat and water to drink. Moses then goes to God and asks God to provide. God provides in miraculous ways, one being every morning there was a food on the ground called manna.

3. TELL: use added expression, vocal fluctuation or body language to help tell today's story

When the Israelites saw it (manna), they asked each other, "What is it?" because they did not know what it was.

So Moses told them, "This is the bread the LORD has given you to eat. The LORD has commanded, 'Each one of you must gather what he needs, about two quarts for every person in your family."

So the people of Israel did this; some people gathered much, and some gathered little. Then they measured it. The person who gathered more did not have too much, nor did the person who gathered less have too little. Each person gathered just as much as he needed.

All of God's people then left the desert and traveled from place to place, as the LORD commanded. They camped at one place, but there was no water there for the people to drink. So they quarreled with Moses and said, "Give us water to drink."

Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why are you testing the LORD?"

But the people were very thirsty for water, so they grumbled against Moses. They said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt? Was it to kill us, our children, and our farm animals with thirst?"

So Moses cried to the LORD, "What can I do with these people? They are almost ready to stone me to death."

The LORD said to Moses, "Go ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you. Carry with you the walking stick that you used to strike the Nile River. Now go! I will stand in front of you on a rock at Mount Sinai. Hit that rock with the stick, and water will come out of it so that the people can drink." Moses did these things as the elders of Israel watched.

God wants to be with His people. He gave instructions to Moses on how to build a place that could move around with them as they travel from Egypt back to the Promised Land. It was called a tabernacle. God's presence was there with the people. He had very specific instructions on how the tabernacle should be built and how everyone could be involved. Today we are going to tell the story as if Moses was telling it to us.

3. TELL: use added expression, vocal fluctuation or body language to help tell today's story

I have been with God and He gave me many instructions, including how to build a tabernacle – a home – for God Himself to dwell. Many things were needed.

So I gathered all of God's people and invited them to be a part in building this home for God. The craftsman could construct everything the Lord commanded. The women could sew the special clothes that the priests would need to wear. Everyone could give materials and the work necessary to complete God's home.

Everyone listened and then went home to prepare their gifts. For those that wanted to give, they brought to the Lord what had been stirred in their hearts to give. (Some were given specific jobs because of their wisdom and skills.)

Soon the craftsmen came to me saying: "We have too much! There is more than enough to do what God has asked of us! Tell the people to stop bringing their gifts and offerings!"

Then the day came when everything was complete! I inspected the building.

Everything was completed just as God had commanded. A cloud came and covered the tabernacle. The Lord's glorious presence and His awesome glory filled God's dwelling place among the people.

Jesus has returned to Heaven and the people who were followers of Him had received the Holy Spirit. As they were obedient to what God asked of them, they could do the same miracles that Jesus did. Two of those first disciples were named Peter and John.

3. TELL: use added expression, vocal fluctuation or body language to help tell today's story

One day Peter and John went to the Temple at three o'clock, the time set each day for the afternoon prayer service.

There, at the Temple gate called Beautiful Gate, was a man who had been crippled all his life. Every day he was carried to this gate to beg for money from the people going into the Temple. The man saw Peter and John going into the Temple and asked them for money.

Peter and John looked straight at him and said, "Look at us!" The man looked at them, thinking they were going to give him some money. But Peter said, "I don't have any silver or gold, but I do have something else I can give you.

By the power of Jesus Christ from Nazareth, stand up and walk!" Then Peter took the man's right hand and lifted him up. Immediately the man's feet and ankles became strong. He jumped up, stood on his feet, and began to walk.

He went into the Temple with them, walking and jumping and praising God. All the people recognized him as the crippled man who always sat by the Beautiful Gate begging for money.

Now they saw this same man walking and praising God, and they were amazed. They wondered how this could happen.

Jesus has been teaching the people what is really important to live in the Kingdom of God. He tells them many things about money and what is important to God about our money Jesus tells the people to be considerate of one another and not to cheat those who are poor, especially the widows, the women whose husbands have died. During these times, they did not collect an offering during the service but they left a box outside the temple for people to put their tithes and offerings in. A tithe was 10% of the money they would make and any additional money the people gave was called their offering.

3. TELL: use added expression, vocal fluctuation or body language to help tell today's story

Jesus sat near the Temple money box and watched the people put in their money. Many rich people gave large sums of money. Then a poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which were only worth a few cents.

Calling his followers to him, Jesus said, "I tell you the truth, this poor widow gave more than all those rich people. They gave only what they did not need. This woman is very poor, but she gave all she had; she gave all she had to live on."

Ball Game: Several different games can be played with a ball. Have the children get in a circle. When you say "GO," or start playing the music, the children pass the ball around the circle until you say "STOP" or stop the music. When that happens, the person who has the ball has to say the next part of the story. When you say "GO" or start the music, the children start passing the ball till you say "STOP."

Create a Song: Create a song that will retell the Bible Story. You might use a song that the children are very familiar with and then change the words so it retells the Bible story. They can create an original song or possibly a rap song.

Ages 14-18

- What did you wonder about as the story was being told?
- The disciples made some difficult choices. What were some of them?
- What choices would you have chosen if you were one of those disciples?
- We often think we need to have certain things to do ministry. What might be some of those things? What were these first followers of Jesus able to do with basically having nothing? What does that say about what God could accomplish through me?
- It is the same Holy Spirit that was working in the first disciples as who lives in us if we are Christ followers. What might you be trusting God for to accomplish His will?
- What might God want us to believe in regards to being a Generosity Hero?
- What does the story tell us about God?

6. PERSONAL RESPONSE QUESTIONS: shift the discussion to a more individual focus

How do you think God wants you to have a part in His story of generosity?

7. CLOSING BLESSING: lead the kids in prayer or allow one of them to take the lead

GENEROSITY SERIES:

Gladly giving to make it better for someone else.

1. OPENING: When was a time when you gave generously to someone when you felt they didn't deserve it?

2. BACKGROUND: a brief explanation of what led up to today's story

Joseph was one of twelve sons. He was his dad's favorite and because of that, the other brothers did not like him and eventually sold and he became a slave in Egypt. The brothers convinced their father that he had been killed by a wild animal. Many difficult things continued to happen to Joseph but he remained faithful to God. Eventually things turned around for Joseph and he became second in command in Egypt. A famine, or lack of food, now comes to where Joseph's father and brothers live. Most of the brothers come to Egypt to buy some food for their families. They do not know what has happened to Joseph and that he is in charge of everything in Egypt including the distribution of the food. Joseph had a plan where his whole family would have to come to Egypt and then he could see his younger brother, Benjamin, and his father, Jacob.

3. TELL: use added expression, vocal fluctuation or body language to help tell today's story

So Joseph said to them, "Come close to me." When the brothers came close to him, he said to them, "I am your brother Joseph, whom you sold as a slave to go to Egypt. Now don't be worried or angry with yourselves because you sold me here. God sent me here ahead of you to save people's lives. No food has grown on the land for two years now, and there will be five more years without planting or harvest. So God sent me here ahead of you to make sure you have some descendants left on earth and to keep you alive in an amazing way. So it was not you who sent me here, but God. God has made me the highest officer of the king of Egypt. I am in charge of his palace, and I am the master of all the land of Egypt.

"So leave quickly and go to my father. Tell him, 'Your son Joseph says: God has made me master over all Egypt. Come down to me quickly."

"Live in the land of Goshen where you will be near me. Your children, your grandchildren, your flocks and herds, and all that you have will also be near me. I will care for you during the next five years of hunger so that you and your family and all that you have will not starve."

Then Joseph hugged his brother Benjamin and cried, and Benjamin cried also. And Joseph kissed all his brothers and cried as he hugged them. After this, his brothers talked with him.

#1: Story Review: Go back through the Story by using questions, fill-ins and correcting wrong statements.

#2: Balloon or Ball Toss: Have the children get into circles of about 8. Have them toss the balloon or ball from one to another either as the music is going or when you have said, "GO." When you stop the music or say "STOP," whoever has the balloon has to say the next part of the story. For some added fun, try adding a marble or small round pebble in the balloon before you inflate it.

5. DISCOVERY QUESTIONS: in small groups, allow conversation and exploration to take shape

Ages 5-9

- What did you like about today's story?
- Can you see the expressions on the peoples' faces in our story? What were they like? What do you think they were thinking and feeling throughout the story?
- Joseph was generous with his attitude by forgiving his brothers. How might you be generous like Joseph?
- What does this story tell us about God?

Ages 10-13

- What I liked best in the story is _____
- If we look at our theme of Generosity (Gladly giving to make it better for someone else.) in what ways was Joseph generously giving to his family? How easy or hard do you think that was for him?
- Imagine that you are Joseph. How would you have responded if you met your brothers after they had treated you like they did? How did Joseph choose to respond? What other responses could he have had?
- How might we have an attitude like Joseph towards God and the things we experience?

Ages 14-18

- As a group decide what the Top 10 events of the story were.
- If we look at our theme of Generosity (Gladly giving to make it better for someone else.) in what ways was Joseph generously giving to his family?
- How would you have responded if you were Joseph? Being generous is not just with our time and money but also in our attitude. In what ways was Joseph being generous with his attitude? In what ways and with whom might you need to be generous?
- How might that feel to generously forgive someone? What happens if they don't receive it from you?
- How might we have an attitude like Joseph towards God and our life experiences?

6. PERSONAL RESPONSE QUESTIONS: shift the discussion to a more individual focus

In being generous with my attitude and being more like Jesus, I believe He is asking me to ______.

7. CLOSING BLESSING: lead the kids in prayer or allow one of them to take the lead

Jesus, You expressed the greatest generosity by expressing your love to us and extending forgiveness when we did not deserve it. Bless these children with the same heart of forgiveness that Joseph and Jesus had for those that hurt them.

Retell Activities & Descriptions

It is important to retell the Bible story after it's been told. Students engage in the story through retelling activities and it helps them in learning it well enough that they can retell it to someone else. Teaching others creates the greatest degree of retention.

The retell activities should be fun and engage the student in the story. Listed below are various ways to retell a Bible story using varied engagement strategies. One way not listed, if the children have Bibles, is to have them open them and re-read the story, perhaps even using different translations. This can also be done by someone reading the story and the leader asking sequential questions which everyone then answers by looking in the Bible.

ART

- **Drawing**: Students can draw what they saw or what they liked best as the story was being told. Have each student share their pictures with the rest of the group.
- **Group Poster:** Students work together on making a poster that can tell the Bible Story. Allow the students to retell the story by using what they drew on the poster.
- **Story Parts:** Students select a certain scene of the story to draw. Have the students put the story in order by the drawings that have been made and retell it as a group.
- **Comic Strip:** Students fold a piece of paper into 4-8 sections. For each scene or action in the Bible story, students draw a picture or object in each box in the order that it happens in the story.
- **Billboard:** Design a roadside billboard of the Bible story or how you see yourself connecting with it.
- **Pictionary:** Different parts of the story are randomly given out and each student needs to draw what they have been given until someone guesses what it is.
- **Tee Shirt Design:** Have each student design the front of a tee shirt that could tell the major parts of the story.
- Logo Design: If there could be just one picture, with no words, that would best tell the Bible story, what would that be? Have the students draw it. You can use this simple picture as a way of reviewing the different Bible stories in weeks to come.
- **Book Cover Design:** Students design and draw their own book cover with words and pictures that best capture the different parts of the Bible story.

DRAMA / PERFORMANCE

- Act it Out: Assign different characters of the story to each of the students. Let them practice before actually acting out the story. See if there are one or two students who want to be the person telling the story while the other children act it out.
- **Retell:** through a character's eyes.
- **Create a Song:** Create a song that will retell the Bible Story. You might use a song that the students are very familiar with and then change the words so it retells the Bible story.
- **Partners:** Have the students get into smaller groups of 2-3. Each student will take a turn retelling the story. If someone gets stuck and can't remember the next part, the others in the group can help them.
- **Pantomime**: Divide the group into several smaller groups. Have one act out the first part of the story without using words. The other groups have to say what is happening. Rotate groups and continue until the story is complete
- **Objects:** Give each group 1-3 different objects. The group needs to use the different objects in the retelling of the story. They can add other objects, but must use the 3 objects given to them.
- Human Slide Show: Find a big cloth to use as a curtain. Two students will hold it up and then drop it when you tell them. Pick several students to be the characters in the story. For each story segment, while the curtain is up, have the students get into a position as though there were a picture or painting of that part of the story. They are to remain perfectly still and then have the cloth dropped so the rest of the group can see it. Each scene changes as the story is retold.
- **Dance:** Retell the story through a dance with or without music and words.
- **Top Ten:** Have the kids, either as a group or individually, write out the top 10 events of the story.
- **Journals:** The children are given the opportunity to just quietly sit and journal what was in the story and what it meant to them.

GAMES

- **Musical Chairs:** Make a circle of chairs (facing out) for each person in your group (minus one). When the music starts, the students start walking in a clockwise direction around the chairs. When you stop the music, everyone quickly finds a chair. The final person standing shares a portion of the story. No students are eliminated. No chairs are removed. Continue doing this until the entire story is retold.
 - **Ball Game:** Identical to Musical Chairs, but played by passing a ball or balloon. Can be played with music or simply the words, "GO" and "STOP". (using a balloon...try adding a marble or small round pebble in the balloon before you inflate it to increase the fun)
 - **Rope Game:** Identical to Musical Chairs, but the string moves, not the students. Using a long piece of string/rope, tie the ends together to form a loop. Students stand in a circle with everyone holding the rope. They will move the rope in one direction until you say "STOP". The student closest to the knot, shares the next part of the story.
 - Movers & Shakers: Spice up the games by adding a feature to HOW they tell their portion of the story!!! Some examples could be:
 - In a low voice
 - In a high voice while jogging in place
 - In a whisper while tiptoeing
 - In a robot voice while doing the robot
- Line Up: Have the students line up in height order. Starting with the tallest, share the story sections until complete.
- **Hide and Seek:** Write phrases of the Bible Story on cards or strips of paper. Place them around the room. Send the students to find them all and then place themselves in the proper order. Have someone read and retell the story.
- Story Chase: Write each part of the story on small cards. Randomly tape one card on the back of each student. Have them assemble the story on their own without removing the card. They should line up so that each student can see the phrase in front of them. Have the student retell the story by reading the card on the person in front of them.

- 11. How did people respond ... ?
- 12. What was God/Jesus teaching or showing them in this event?
- 13. What is something you learned today about ...

 - c. This story?
 - d. What it means to follow Jesus?
 - e. Yourself?
- 14. What choices did the people make? What else could they have done? What happened because of the choices they made?
- 15. How are the characters alike or different in the story?

- 8. Which character in today's story do you most relate to?
- 9. What do you feel is really important to God/Jesus? To the character?
- 10. In what ways are we also like? In what ways are we different?
- 11. After hearing the story, how might it change how you view yourself?
- 12. Why do you think God put this story in the Bible?
- 13. What is something you never realized before today?
- 14. What is the most interesting thing you heard today?
- 15. How did this story challenge you or encourage you?

Discover Questions - Hands (Actions)

My goal is to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit to respond and apply what I've learned from the story. What does God want me, specifically, to do with what I've learned? I want to SERVE God by obeying what I've learned from His Word.

- 4. What should you do differently because of today's story? What difference will this make in how you love and serve Him?
- 5. What did we learn about being a follower of Jesus from this story? How can you put this insight into practice this week?
- 6. How should we respond to God/Jesus today?
- 7. After hearing the story, how will you live differently?
- 8. Do you want to know God like this? Is there something happening right now in your life where God/Jesus/the Holy Spirit could help you?
- 9. Who can you share this story with this week?
- 10. How do you think God wants you to have a part in His story?



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
